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A look back atJuly – Sept Activities




This July OR-1 said farewell to SgtMaj Owens.



Program Description

The VA's Homeless Providers Grant and Per Diem Program (GPD) is a transitional housing program where the VA partners with community agencies to provide services to homeless Veterans. All Veterans enrolled in GPD will need to enroll in the VA Portland Healthcare System.

In this program clients will work to:

- · Find stable and permanent housing
- · Increase skill levels and/or income
- · Obtain greater self-determination and self-sufficiency
- · Address mental health, physical health and substance use issues

Program Minimum Eligibility

- · Programs will accept other than honorable discharges (no dishonorable discharge)
- · Veteran must be homeless or at risk of becoming homeless
- · Cannot have open warrants
- . Must be able to manage activities of daily living (mobility, eating, dressing, bathing, etc)
- · Must be able to live in a mixed use space
- · No predatory criminal history (ie: sex offences, stalking, kidnapping)

Program Structure Highlights

- · Full time clinician managing the program
- · Behavior focused program based on Cognitive Behavioral Therapy strategies
- 29 bed program
 - o 19 male and 10 female
 - o 5 bridge to housing (approved for a voucher and waiting on an apartment)
 - o 5 service intensive (job search, treatment, etc. required)
 - o 19 low barrier (no requirements)
- 24 hour facility
- · 2 staff members on sight at all times
- · On-site services provided
 - Mental health
 - Substance use
 - Group (mental health, support, etc.)
 - Case management
 - o Peer support
- Established community partnerships and support



#1. History of the Auto Litter Bags— In May of 2011, Golda Fabian had purchased a bag that was made from cloth at a local bazaar event. The bag was re-usable, but small. Golda suggested to the Chapter to make something like this to help with the cost of the annual scholarships that we give out. Sally Van Wie took the bag home and redesigned the one-piece bag to make it adaptable to become the "Auto Litter" bag we now make today. Heidi Tanada started an assembly line of making many of the bags each week. Today, more than 1500 bags have been made by these dedicated members! The chapter has been making them for more than 11 years as a fundraiser for the annual scholarships we give out!

In the past, our Chapter ladies have spent countless hours at bazaars and various convention events selling these litter bags. We have them in a wide variety of fabrics including military, college & pro football teams, animal designs, etc. These bags can be used in your car (hanging from the glovebox) or next to your favorite lounge chair! Golda Fabian

Ninety-seven years ago, Golda
Fabian was born to a logger and
his wife who lived in Grand
Ronde, but she was not just a
small-town girl...she had an adventurous spirit. She was ahead
of her time, joining the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II
and fighting discrimination
against women in the military
and throughout her career.

Golda, one of five children, had

polio when she was 2 years old, and when she was 11, she spent three months at the Shriners' hospital in Portland to have corrective surgery on her right leg. Years later, a military doctor conducting a boot camp physical exam said she could not remain in the Marine Corps because one foot and leg were a little smaller from the polio although she had passed the entrance physical exam. "He told me to wait for my discharge orders, and I started crying," Golda said. "He sent me to the chaplain, who told me, 'There's a war on.' I kept doing my drills and classes and never heard any more about it."

"Before I enlisted, I had gone as far as I could at work, and I was always kind of adventurous," Golda said. "I felt I wasn't doing enough to help the war effort in my job... and I have always loved uniforms. Since I have always been competitive, if I was going into the service, I wanted to go into the one that was the most difficult to get into."

Golda enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps on March 2, 1944, and left for boot camp at Camp Lejeune, N.C., on April 28, 1944, where she quickly learned that the men did not want to deal with "petticoat Marines." While the training was not nearly as rigorous as the regimen today, "it was pretty formidable," Golda said. "The first week I thought I was going to die, and the second week I was hoping I would." In addition to classes, there was close-order drill and physical-endurance training, and Golda added, "The gas chamber drill was the worst experience, and all of us remember that one vividly!"

After boot camp, Golda was assigned to two weeks of mess duty, cleaning trays and the mess hall from morning to night while enduring high temperatures and humidity. Next she was assigned to the Marine base in San Diego and went to the Sound Motion Picture Technicians School at the adjacent Navy base. "When we had completed the course, the officer in charge told us that we were all competent enough to work in any theater in the U.S. except, he added, 'You women would never be hired because it is considered a man's job." There were no openings in theater, so Golda was assigned to the post office at the Marines Air Depot at Miramar, California. "I was assigned to the directory service in the base post office, which is where I worked until I was discharged," she said. "The base was the processing point for all Marine Corps air personnel going to the South Pacific and coming back to the states for reassignment. Consequently, there was a constant flow of mail going both ways, which had to be readdressed to each recipient."

In July 1945, Golda was swimming in the base pool and broke her right arm while diving from the 3-meter board. Although she was officially in the sick bay until the war ended, she was assigned the duty of cleaning the women's rest rooms after a Navy nurse told her, "You've got a good left arm so you are in charge of the head." Golda added, "When I wasn't polishing mirrors and cleaning toilets, they gave me capsules to fill with a medical powder and bandages to roll."

I had been promoted to PFC on Sept. 13, 1945, and my pay at the time of my discharge was \$54 a month. I received my honorable discharge on Nov. 23, 1945. Remembering her time in the service, Golda said, "It was one of the best times of my life, and the pride I felt in wearing the Marine Corps uniform is indescribable."
